The first story involves my cup. While eating at Il Solito Posto located at Via L:ambertenghi, 9, Como, Italy 22100 I noticed the unusual design on the cup. However, I didn't ask or do anything as we were rushing off to another

thing to do. However, the food was some of the best I've ever eaten anywhere in the world and at fairly reasonable prices. Now 3 of the 4 of us are Italian and my brother's wife, Marie, is an excellent Italian cook.... and I mean excellent. I dabble in Italian cooking and my Irish heritage wife has become an aficionado of the food. So, knowing a good thing when we see it, we returned a couple of days later to try the food again. Yup! It was out of this world again. But this time I asked the waitress (cameriera) if I could buy a cup and saucer. My limited Italian and her limited English left us both puzzled. She went to the owner, Fausto, who speaks no English whatsoever. He thought I wanted to buy coffee beans. When we both realized that we were going nowhere, he brought me into one of three dining rooms in the ristorante and asked a gentleman to translate for us. When he understood what I wanted to do, he beckoned me to follow him and then hands me a set of 6 cups and saucers which are made for his restaurant

with the restaurant name and the artist he did the design. I only wanted one so back to the gentleman to translate. He says to me, he wants you to have the set as a gift. We thanked each other profusely. This man didn't owe us anything. We were the "ugly Americans" as so many of us are still seen in Europe, but not so perceived by the masses. He was simply a generous man who appreciated that I wanted to buy the cup not just take it. So, the lesson is as business people we should recognize our clientele, customers or clients as people; and, realize that you get more by being nice and understanding. A small gesture of giving goes a long way in appreciation. I think too many of us forget this in our business practice. It was busy and I only carry American Express cards. He doesn't take AMEX any longer as he believes he was unfairly treated in a dispute with a customer. The waiter called him over and we chatted about his olive oil, which was exquisite. My sister-in-law wanted to buy some.

It means that corporations may be showing profits on the backs of the unemployed and on the backs of the tax payers with the stimulus funds that have been doled out. It's been proved for sure that the stock market has nothing to do with the economy; and, again, if it did there would be job growth and lesser inventory of unsold housing, etc. But it's not the case, so what does it mean. It seems to me that it is keeping share funds in the coffers as must of the investing public only watch their portfolio and have no idea what goes on behind this market movement.

ABOUT THE STIMULUS-

New Jersey has received \$2.90 billion in stimulus and is using it in 520 projects. The two counties receiving the largest stimulus awards are Essex with \$271,431,690 for 32 projects and second is Camden with \$180,111,993 for 20 projects.

To give you an idea of what appears to be duplication. In Essex County there \$10 million for 10 bridges to be painted and then there is painting for a 2 moveable bridges at \$30 million and then another \$10 million for corridor bridge painting which crosses to other counties. Sounds like the painting contractor is the only one making any money.

A little closer to home is Monmouth County with 31 projects estimated at \$77,573,390 and Ocean County with a mere 19 projects at a meager \$28,991,427. I guess Monmouth has louder voices in Washington than Ocean.

In Ocean there is \$500,000 earmarked to remove the Forked River Game Farm

facilities. Where to you ask? Not a clue. Just be careful if local restaurants start serving ostrich steaks. United Way of Ocean County is receiving \$22,427 for emergency shelter and food stuff. If we had employment we wouldn't need this and what does it really provide and for how long. It seems paltry at best.

Now included is a bid of \$ unknown for Lakehurst Naval Base which is federal property yet it is shown as New Jersey receiving it. Yes, some residents will benefit by employment but why is it in the stimulus. Isn't it a military base and shouldn't it be part of the Dept. of Defense budget?

And there is \$1 million for design completion for the Rt 35 corridor from Toms River to Mantoloking. A million bucks to "complete" the design work". Wow! Hey, and then another \$1million for the design completion from Seaside Park to Toms River. And this is for paving design.

If you have time to research the various projects it's amazing the waste that exists. What's frightening is that much of the monies are going to yes maybe welcomed repairs but not truly necessary and some are just wasteful. We need to pay attention in order to return to true growth.

ON THE STREET WHERE YOU LIVE-

In 1956 in the Broadway play, "My Fair Lady", there was a song was introduced titled, "On the Street Where You Live". And 50+ years ago our lives may have been simple enough to think in terms of our own streets. Today in a global entwined world, our streets are no longer nearly important as then.

The charts on the following page reveal some interesting conclusions. We are surrounded by those of greater wealth than any other place in the world. Cleanliness is less than "Godliness" in the US. We are a dwindling nation of Americans and have less chance of longer life than inhabitants of many other nations. We are a nation of lesser growth than the nations with which we compete; and, although not in these statistics, our growth is driven by the minority sectors of our population (that's not negatively implied), just an understanding of the changing times from 50+ years ago.

And, we are not the happiest playground evidenced by our divorce rate.

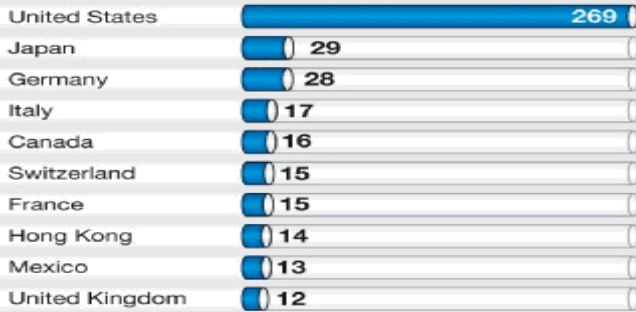

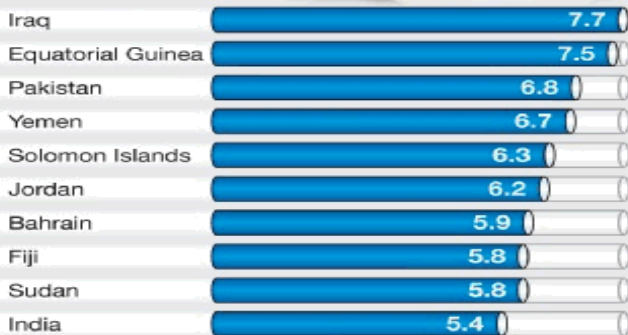

The Highest Household Size



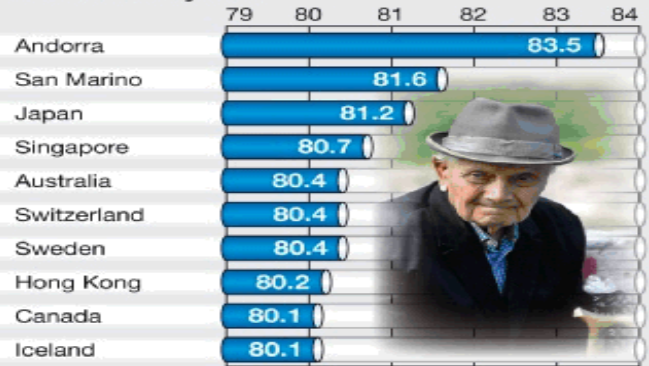
Persons per Household

Top Ten Countries with Highest Life Expectancy

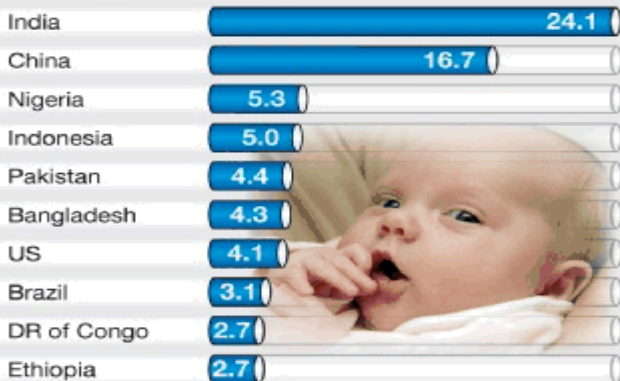
Indication in years
